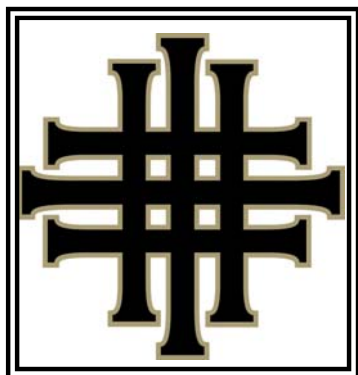

General Support

1. *Unrestricted Gift to “the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph”*

An unrestricted gift allows the Diocese to apply the funds to the area of greatest need among the approximately 134,000 Catholics in the 27 counties of Northwest Missouri that comprise the Diocese.

2. *Unrestricted Gift to a Parish within the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph, to be designated “for the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph for the benefit of (a specific Parish at a specific address)”*

This type of gift, much like the unrestricted gift to the Diocese, allows the pastor and pastoral council of a parish to apply the funds to the area of greatest need in the parish. (Such a gift would flow to the parish, even though Canon Law says the Diocese is the entity to which all estate and trust gifts are designated for the benefit of the named Parish.)

3. *Designated Gift “to the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph” or “to the Diocese for the benefit of (a specific Parish)”*

The donor may identify a specific need of the Diocese or the parish to which he/she wants to give. This type of gift is often used for a building project or to replace or add to a structure, or it can be used to establish a program that the donor favors.

4. *Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)*

- a. Do I need an attorney to help prepare my estate plan and, if so, how do I find one?
You need qualified legal counsel to help prepare a will or trust. Computer generated forms do not address the details of current state law and cannot provide for the special considerations of most families. Finding an estate planning attorney can be as easy as asking for a referral from a friend who you know has done an estate plan. The Office of Stewardship & Development can provide guidance.
- b. What are the appropriate legal documents and what information will my attorney need?
You should ask your counsel to draft a will or trust, a durable power of attorney (DPOA) and a health care directive with an agent appointed to act (HCD), one for each spouse. Once you have retained counsel, you will probably be provided a questionnaire that will focus on the necessary information to draft these documents. Generally, the information is your personal family data, financial holdings, and desired distributions, including charitable intentions.
- c. How much is all this likely to cost?
You should ask this question of your professional adviser “up front” once you have determined the basic scope of the work that is necessary to be undertaken. Many qualified attorneys do not charge for the first visit and almost all can specify their normal charges for each type of work that you might need. You have to ask!
- d. How often do I need to review my estate plan?
At least every four years to make sure that the people you have appointed for critical roles are still able to serve. One other guideline is whenever a major event occurs in

your family – the birth of another child, death of a relative, etc.

Ways to Give

1. *Charitable Bequests*

A charitable bequest is a gift given through a person's Will or Trust. Bequests can include anything of value, such as cash, stock certificates, IRAs, life insurance, savings bonds, jewelry, real estate, antique furniture, etc. Bequests are the simplest way for people to remember the Church that has impacted their life. "Through a bequest," according to Debra Ashton in The Complete Guide to Planned Giving, "individuals of great wealth and of modest means can help to preserve or to create for the enjoyment of future generations an institution, a way of life, or an ideal which has had a special meaning for them." Ashton estimates that 85% of all planned gifts come through bequests. Therefore it makes sense for a parish or school to focus the majority of their planned giving efforts to promote charitable bequests.

2. *Gifts of Retirement Plan Assets*

A gift of all or a portion of one's retirement plan assets from an IRA, 401 (k), 403 (b) or other retirement plan may be one of the smartest and least "expensive" ways to favor one's favorite parish, school, or other ministry of the Church. Very substantial sums are currently invested in many persons' retirement plans. In many cases, this may be the principal asset owned at one's death. If these assets pass to family members, their value is taxed at the rate of the recipient's income tax—that is, if a child is in the 25% tax bracket when he/she receives retirement plan assets from a parent, then a 25% tax will be levied on the receipt of these funds. Giving assets from retirement accounts to charity can by-pass this tax as the funds pass directly to a charity which does not have to pay the income tax due to its tax exempt status. Moreover these gifts can be accomplished quite easily, without even the cost or inconvenience of seeing an attorney. Most retirement fund managers provide "beneficiary designation forms" available through a web site or by calling the manager of the funds. The proper legal name of the

charity may be listed on the beneficiary designation form and a portion or amount of the fund to be designated for the benefit of the respective charity. At the death of the retirement fund holder, the designated funds pass directly to charity without taxation.

3. *Gifts of Appreciated Stock or Mutual Funds*

One of the other very favorable tax-wise gifts that a donor can make to his/her parish, school or other ministry is appreciated stock or mutual funds. Such gifts are smart gifts for several reasons:

- (a) Such gifts can normally be larger than cash gifts;
- (b) The donor deducts the *fair market value* of the stock/mutual fund, up to certain liberal limitations; and
- (c) Neither the donor nor the charity pays any capital gains or income tax on the transaction.

The Office of Stewardship and Development processes dozens of stock and mutual fund gifts each year. We have standard procedures that are relatively easily understood and can be accessed with a phone call to our Office at 816-756-1858 x 516. Stock and mutual fund gifts are processed through an experienced broker that knows the “ins and outs” of this type of giving and can readily work with you or your financial adviser to make the transaction as smooth as possible.

4. *Life Income Gifts*

Life income gifts are “gifts that give back” or “gifts that give twice.” This is because they first pay the donor and then, at the donor’s death, the balance goes to charity. The two most common

life income gifts are Charitable Gift Annuities (CGAs) and Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRTs).

Charitable Gift Annuities:

A charitable gift annuity (CGA) is an agreement between an individual or couple and the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph by which the donor(s) irrevocably transfers assets (usually cash or stock) to the Diocese in exchange for fixed payments for life. The annuity payment rate is based on the age(s) of the Person(s) entering into the agreement. The Diocese limits these gifts to donors at least 65 (except for “deferred gift annuities” which can be entered at a younger age to be payable no earlier than age 65) and to gifts of at least \$5,000. Typically CGA’s are in the range of \$5,000 to \$25,000, although six figure gifts can and do occur. The Diocese has created an informative brochure to illustrate the operation of our CGA’s. We also routinely advertise this giving vehicle in *The Catholic Key*. Confidential, no-obligation, detailed illustrations of CGA’s are available through the Office of Stewardship and Development, 816-756-1858 x 529.

Charitable Remainder Trusts

Charitable Remainder Trusts (CRT’s) are similar to Charitable Gift Annuities in terms of “giving twice” but differ in several significant ways. CRTs are (1) typically far larger (\$100,000 minimum) than the typical gift annuity; (2) they are not administered by the Diocese, but require the services of wealth managers—an attorney to set up the trust and a bank to administer it; (3) they are normally one part of a sophisticated estate and tax plan; and (4) they are more flexible in terms of who receives the payment streams.

5. Life Insurance

There are two common ways that life insurance is used to make a gift. First, policies for which the original purpose is no longer applicable (e.g. college education for a child who has

graduated), can be given to your parish, school or other ministry. When the donor transfers ownership of the policy, he or she receives an immediate tax deduction. Upon the death of the donor, the death benefit of the policy will be given to the parish, school or ministry. (Note: if the policy is not paid up, the Church must decide whether or not to keep paying the premiums or cash in the policy.)

Second, donors may purchase new policies, if they are insurable, and name their parish, school or other ministry as owner and beneficiary of the policy. In this way, the donor pays a small amount of money (the premiums) in installments over a period of time or as a single one-time premium in exchange for a large pay-off at a later time (the proceeds of the policy at the time of death of the donor). If structured correctly, the donor may claim the premiums paid on the policy as a charitable deduction. Some donors find this method a way to “leverage” their resources to achieve a larger gift than they ever could have made otherwise.

The variety and complexity of insurance products is quite astounding. In recent times, the cost of term insurance has gone down (due to increasing life expectancies, better health care, etc.) so gifting through insurance may have become more attractive. In all insurance giving, it is important to consult with a competent financial or insurance expert to achieve the best result. The Office of Stewardship and Development at the Diocese can help you connect with such experts.

6. Payable or Transferable on Death Accounts and Beneficiary Deeds

Fairly recent developments in the law provide greater flexibility to donors who wish to maintain control of their assets during their lifetimes, but transfer all or part of their value at the time of the death to their parish, school or other ministry. Bank, brokerage and other financial accounts may be “payable or transferable on death” so that the value of the account passes directly to the designated beneficiaries at the

time of the owner's death, outside of probate. In this way, the delay and cost of probate can be avoided with respect to these assets.

Indeed, the titling of most IRA, 401 (k), 403 (b) and similar retirement accounts provides for beneficiary designations rather readily. Through one's human resources department or even on the web page of the administrator of such plans, a "beneficiary designation form" may be obtained that can very effectively transfer assets at one's death. These transfers occur "outside of probate" and do not interfere with the lifetime control of the assets in the accounts. All such designations are revocable in the event that the assets are, for any reason, needed by the owner of the account.

Similarly, with respect to real estate, "beneficiary deeds" can be prepared during the life of the donor to allow the donor to maintain complete ownership and control of their home or other real property for his/her life, but to transfer it to "the beneficiary(ies)"—including charities—upon his/her death. These deeds must be prepared by an attorney and recorded in the recorder of deeds office where the real estate is situated. They are not very expensive (probably under \$250 and possibly as low as \$100) and can prove a very valuable tool of charitable planning.

Education

1. Parish Schools and Early Childhood Centers

The Diocese has 29 elementary schools with a total enrollment of nearly 8,000 students and 8 early childhood education centers of nearly 1,000 students. Gifts to parish schools and education centers, whether undesignated or designated, support the Diocese's major commitment to education and emphasize the spiritual growth and service learning that leads to later success in life.

2. Diocesan High Schools

Four secondary schools -- Archbishop O'Hara, St. Pius X, St. Mary's Bundshu Memorial and Bishop LeBlond -- educate more than 1,300 students. Gifts to diocesan high schools support educational programs, extracurricular activities, need-based financial aid, and prepare students for college, employment, and to become leaders for our church and communities.

3. Central City School Fund (CCSF)

The Central City School Fund (CCSF) supports quality Catholic education for the children of Kansas City's urban core. For almost 20 years, the CCSF has provided operational support to the parish schools in Kansas City's poorest neighborhoods, and helped families by providing needs-based tuition assistance. The CCSF has been instrumental in keeping high-quality schools teaching Catholic values available to those seeking to break the cycle of poverty.

4. Endowment Trust Fund for Catholic Education (ETFCE)

Gifts and bequests to the endowment strengthen parish and school-based educational programs in the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph. Through separate accounts, the Trust Fund helps to secure the future of Catholic schools and parish-based religious education programs.

5. *Foundation for Inclusive Religious Education (F.I.R.E.)*

The Foundation for Inclusive Religious Education (F.I.R.E.) provides children with special needs the opportunity for an inclusive Catholic education in their home parish schools. F.I.R.E. provides financial grants to schools within the Diocese of Kansas City-St. Joseph to assist with the costs of educating children with special needs in an inclusive classroom setting. Inclusive education enables children with special needs to reach their highest potential, and enlightens and expands the lives of all children by teaching acceptance, compassion, and the value of every child of God.

6. *Education Office*

The Diocesan School Office guides and advances the educational mission of Catholic education in our schools. Specific charges include the coordination of religious education, recruitment and supervision of teachers and other educational staff, oversight of the accreditation process, directing planning efforts, implementing curriculum, and collaborating with community partners.

7. *Youth Office*

Through workshops, retreats, and conferences, the office assists parishes in their effort to enrich Catholic youth. Programs are geared toward the needs of middle and high school students and youth ministers working in parishes.

8. *Young Adult and Campus Ministry*

Young adults from the ages of 18 to 40 confront special life challenges and the Diocese responds with special supports. Campus ministry centers provide social and support systems for students at Central Missouri State, Missouri Western State, Northwest Missouri State and University of Missouri at Kansas City. These programs reach out to young Catholics who are living away from home for the first time. Additionally, the office builds community, provides service opportunities, and nurtures the faith of newly independent young people in their first careers, new relationships, and early-married lives.

9. *Office of Family Life*

This office provides marriage preparation, marriage enrichment, family support, and guidance for troubled

marriages. Its programs include “Rainbows” for children and youth suffering the consequences of separation of parents; “As for Me and My House” a program to strengthen families by increasing awareness and reconciliation regarding the dangers of pornography; “Marriage Encounter” to encourage better communication between couples in married life; “God’s Plan for a Joy-Filled Marriage” for all couples preparing for marriage in the Diocese to embrace the Church’s teachings on faith, human sexuality, and natural family planning; and “Men on a Mission” an annual event to promote leadership, discipleship, discipleship and friendship among men.

10. Bishop Helmsing Institute

Ensuring a lifetime commitment to growing in faith is the charge of the Bishop Helmsing Institute. The Institute provides a comprehensive course of adult education toward the goal of strengthening the laity of life in the secular world. The Institute exists to promote living holy lives.

Clergy Training and Support

1. *Vocation Office*

Led by priests and supported by lay volunteers, the office reaches out to prospective priests and nuns and assists with discernment. A concerted effort is made to ensure that religious life is the right choice and that the prospective candidate is well suited for religious life. Through a variety of retreats, special study opportunities, and mentoring, the staff assists candidates in the discernment process.

2. *Seminarians' Fund*

The Diocese supports the theological education of seminarians who study for the priesthood at approved college seminaries. In addition, the fund subsidizes on-the-job training experiences in parishes, schools, social service institutions or other ministries. Prior to ordination, a four-year seminary education can exceed \$100,000. These costs often are borne by the Diocese.

3. *Priests' Retirement and Post-Retirement Welfare Fund*

In honor of lives of service, the Diocese strives to provide a dignified retirement for its clergy through the Priests' Retirement Fund. At present, the normal retirement age of priests is 70, but many continue service past this age. In addition, the Diocese provides retired priests health care insurance and long-term care insurance.

4. *Worship Office*

Through training, the Diocese ensures consistent treatment of liturgical norms by ministers of music, proclamation, environment and art. Departmental staff also plan and execute diocesan liturgies. Additionally, the office consults with parishes as they design, build and remodel worship space.

5. *Diaconate*

Ordained for the ministry of service, deacons require formation, training, and certification. The office facilitates all aspects of this important ministry. Increasingly, the presence of deacons enhances the life of parishes and provides additional ministers to support pastoral care.

Special and Ministry

1. Hispanic Ministry

Staff coordinates, reaches out to, and initiates programs for the growing Hispanic population of the Diocese. Through liturgies, special celebrations unique to the Hispanic culture, and language-relevant programming, the Diocese seeks to promote the participation of Hispanics in the life of the Church.

Social Services

1. *Catholic Charities*

The largest human service organization in the United States, Catholic Charities USA is known for its efficient delivery of help to the poor of all faiths. Catholic Charities of Kansas City-St. Joseph provides counseling, emergency assistance, youth services, services for pregnant women, adoption, foster care, in-home health services for the elderly and disabled, ministry to persons with disabilities, rural community development and advocacy programs. A gift to Catholic Charities helps the less fortunate in an efficient, dignified and professional manner.

2. *Respect Life*

This ministry supports programs and actions that proclaim the dignity of all human life. Through staff and volunteers, the Church upholds that life is sacred in all its forms, from conception to natural death. Consistent education for persons of all ages and support for advocacy efforts are among important duties.

3. *Office of Human Rights*

This Office exists to promote Catholic Social Teaching by undertaking programs and to raise and distribute funds to support that Teaching. It focuses on the following programs and issues: ‘Catholics for Justice,’ a program to integrate Biblical teaching and social action on critical issues in society; ‘Campaign for Human Development,’ a program to

focus on the root causes of poverty in America and to raise money and distribute grants to projects that are managed by the poor; ‘Catholic Relief Services,’ a program to help more than 80 counties with emergency care and to collect and distribute funds from our Diocese to support this world-wide effort; and ‘Rural Life,’ a program that focuses on the critical issue of the welfare of the family farm and safe economically just production of food.

4. *Catholic Cemeteries*

For decades, the Church has provided a respectful place for burial of the dead. The network of cemeteries throughout the Diocese enables the preservation of religious traditions and access for loved ones to visit the graves of those who have gone before.

Communications

1. The Catholic Key

This weekly Catholic newspaper reports events of local, national, and international significance. The diocesan newspaper supports evangelization, advocacy for justice, and reinforces the teachings of the Church.

2. Information and Media Relations

Through a variety of social communication media, the office assists the Church in telling its story in everyday life. In addition to coordinating the release of information by the Diocese, training personnel, developing electronic and print communications, the office serves as liaison for media representatives in the local, regional and national press.
